Think you have what it takes to win a solo exhibition at Axel's in 2023 (first prize)?

Entries will be not only be judged by a small panel of professionals embedded in the art and photography world of Vermont but by your peers (a person who is equal to another in abilities and qualifications!).

***This year's Photo Shoot-Out theme is Reflections*** – chosen by Paul Haverstick, last year's Shoot-Out winner.

Reflections in photography can lead to some amazing effects and beautiful images. They can be found everywhere, on easily available things like glass, water or any shiny and reflective surface. Yet, despite being commonplace, they're still fascinating and beautiful to photograph. The wonderful thing is that they can completely alter the image from something fairly straightforward to something richer or abstract or otherwise more artistic. Reflections can spice up an otherwise lifeless photo and turn it into an amazing image.

Rule #1 – All photographs must be taken from outdoors.

Rule #2 – A point of reference needs to be within the composition.

All capture and processing methods are welcome.

Entries will be judged based on the following:

Originality/Creativity/Imagination

Composition

Emotional Impact/Expressiveness

Presentation
